Dean academics look into the effective implementation of the curriculum specified by the University. Implementing ICT and Computer based knowledge and planning to enhance need based courses/workshops in each department of the institute.

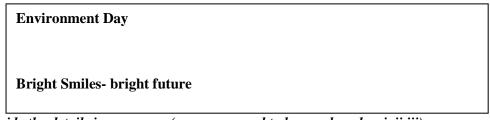

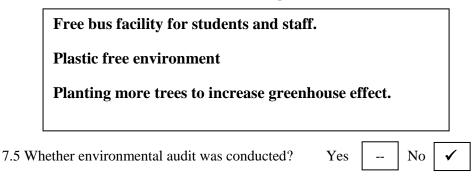
